Activity 1.2 In Your Own Words

Instructions:

Step One: Take a look at the opinions expressed below. Think about how many different opinions you can identify.

When you are ready, complete Step Two of the activity on the following page.

We should only be raising animals in "free-range" environments, where animals are allowed to roam freely instead of being kept in barns or cages. Sometimes, "free-range" environments can encourage more disease and other problems. We should look instead to provide open and safe housing that encourages natural behaviours but also protects food safety and hygiene.

Animals are necessary as a food supply and products that we need. However, we should always have the humane care of these animals as our first priority.

Confinement of animals, even short periods that may occur during transportation, should be banned. Animals that are confined have inappropriate social contact, an inability to exercise and increased stress levels.

Animal science should focus on the effects of human behaviour. Inappropriate handling during livestock animal production and slaughter can cause fear, stress and physical trauma. It can affect ease of handling, reproductive performance, growth, productivity, health and meat quality. Inappropriate handling of companion animals causes fear, stress and behavioural problems.

The link between animal welfare and health is supported by scientific evidence. Therefore, improvements in animal welfare can help make sure food production is safe and nutritious.

Companion pet owners should not be called or considered to be "owners." They should be called pet "guardians." People are demanding to know how the animals they eat are being raised.

Consider what you believe about the relationship between people and domestic animals. Place yourself on the animal values spectrum. Why would you place yourself there?




